



The Saint Charles Ghost

My grandparents lived on Saint Charles Avenue when I was young. My grandfather worked out of town on weekdays so my grandmother was often home alone and I loved keeping her company. The Halloween of my 6th year was spent at Grandmama's house. My older brother was out gallivanting with his friends in Cloverdale and my younger brothers

were home with Mama and Daddy, so for Halloween it was just me and Grandmama. There were lots of kids in the neighborhood in those days and I joined in with a few of them and we walked from house to house gathering treats. My grandmother and some neighbor ladies sat on the front porch talking and snapping beans.

After my friends and I had been to every house on the block we sat down and exchanged goodies. My choice of treat was candy cigarettes. Something caught my eye and I looked up and saw a large white ghost coming down my grandmother's driveway. I froze. It was huge. It must have been 10 feet tall. I watched it come down the driveway into the street.

By this time mayhem had begun. There were screams and children scattering to get as far away from the ghost as possible. The long thin ghost slowly glided down the middle of the now empty street. I've never run so fast in my life. I ran through front yards, ran down a driveway, ran through back yards, jumped bushes, climbed over fences, and finally flew through Grandmama's back door. I was crying as I ran around the house looking for my grandmother. I remembered she had been sitting on the front porch so I yanked open the front door but she wasn't there. Nobody was there. I was all by myself but I felt safe inside the house. Grandmama was probably at a neighbor's house and didn't know the horror that was currently floating down the middle of her street.

I sat on the sofa eating what candy hadn't bounced out of my bucket, and after what felt like an hour I heard the back screen door slam. My heart hit the ceiling. I didn't make a sound. Then I heard her call out my name. I jumped off the sofa and ran into the kitchen and into my grandmother's arms. As I rattled off everything that had happened. Grandmama went to the freezer and took out a carton of ice cream and fixed us both a bowl of vanilla ice cream topped with chocolate syrup. Between bites I told her what happened. She said I shouldn't worry since the ghost had probably moved on to another street by now.

After the ice cream was finished I took a long hot bath in the claw foot tub. When I was wrinkly enough I dried off and got into my nightgown. On heading down the hall to the bedroom I noticed Grandmama stuffing a load of white sheets into the washing machine. I talked with her while she swept up dirt from around the back door. I was tired and went on to bed waiting for Grandmama to join me after she finished cleaning. She was always cleaning.

It wasn't long and dishes were washed and the kitchen light turned off and Grandmama came to bed. I was asleep before her bedside lamp was turned off. I had no idea that just a few hours earlier my grandmother was holding above her head a broom stick over which was draped white sheets that had been sewn together so as to be long enough to cover her shoes as she walked down the middle of Saint Charles Avenue. I was snuggled up that night in bed with the Saint Charles Ghost.



MARILYN RUTHERFORD 1928-2018



Marilyn Rutherford, long-time neighbor on St. Charles Avenue. and friend to many, died on Thursday, September 13th at home at age 90, lovingly cared for by her granddaughter April. "The Energizer Bunny" finally ran out of steam.

Marilyn was born in New York but moved with her husband to Montgomery for his work with Blount

Construction. After his unexpected death at age 50 in 1983, Marilyn moved to Capitol Heights, a neighborhood she loved and served until her final days.

Marilyn was an active member of the Capitol Heights Civic Association for many years, serving on the Executive Committee, the Welcoming Committee [many neighbors received her signature pumpkin breads], Yard of the Month, and the initial push for historic designation of certain key streets in the neighborhood. She was an inveterate gardener, keeping her lawn and garden [AND storm grate] manicured until the end [planting, weeding and picking up sticks while on a walker!] Until her second knee replacement, she had a regular walking route in the neighborhood. She attended her last Spring Fling and National Night Out on a cane.

We extend our condolences to her family, and to ourselves. We have lost a good neighbor and friend.

Reading Elizabeth Ferguson's article about the Ghost on St. Charles made me think of other

stories I have heard neighbors sharing about growing up in Capitol Heights. We are rich with stories in this community.

I was talking to my neighbor, Paul Rawlinson, recently, and he was telling me about the football games back in Montgomery between Lee High School and Lanier! So I looked it up to find out what size crowds actually went to the games. According to Minna Roth Hill's article, *A Significant History*, "By the 1960's the rivalry between the two 4-A football teams, the Sidney Lanier Poets and the Robert E. Lee Generals, had become legendary. Lanier's battle cry was, 'The Poet's pen is mightier than the General's sword.' Each year tickets for the Lee-Lanier game went on sale at the box office at Cramton Bowl months before the game and were sold out within hours. Crowds of 22,000 fans or more scurried into Cramton Bowl for the games, which were usually the last game of the season for both teams. The half-time shows were also an attracting factor to the Lee-Lanier games. Showboats, floats, fireworks, and dazzling band performances entertained the crowds. The rivalry between the two schools became an intense and ongoing feud in the city, with pranks and even violence entering into the equation at times."¹

Can you imagine that today?
